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Rescue Me from Baby Shark – Why High Quality Music is Important for Young Children

As educators and caregivers of young children, you know that children love music. Without even thinking about it, you could probably list five to ten songs that you use in your classroom on a weekly basis to

engage your students in various classroom activities and routines. And that is wonderful!

But sometimes the music we choose for young children can be overstimulating to their developing nervous systems. Have you ever played a song to help "get the wiggles out", but then observed your children struggling to calm down afterwards? Or put on music during an activity, and the energy level in the room starts to get chaotic and loud? Or maybe you are just annoyed and tired of singing and hearing the same songs over and over and over again. Using high-quality, developmentally appropriate music in your classroom not only supports desired classroom outcomes, but is also one of the most powerful tools we have to support the brain development, general health and wellbeing, early language and literacy skills, and social-emotional development of our young students. It helps to build a strong classroom community while fostering joy, play, and connection.

Research suggests the amount of backand-forth conversation that young children experience is linked to:

- brain development
- language skills
- social and emotional development



Early language exposure, in particular interactive talk, is one of the strongest predictors of brain development. The amount of language interaction a child experiences affects brain processing speed, brain structure and function, IQ and language abilities years later, as well as vocabulary development.
